


Georgian



The Georgian or Georgian-Revival house style developed in the late 1930s. Its compact cubical shape made efficient use of expensive building materials during the Great Depression.

The house features minimalist ornamentation. A bay window and shutters make the house appear more stately and prominent than the simple cube shape might otherwise appear.

In the years after World War II, high demand for new housing continued the popularity of the Georgian. Thousands were built in outlying parts of Chicago and in nearby suburbs. The style remained popular until the mid-1950s.
